On the 45<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this author’s becoming an official historical consultant for clinical pastoral chaplaincy, followed by his doctoral dissertation about Dunbar’s work: Healing and Wholeness ....  
On the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this author’s first presentation to the College of Pastoral Supervision & Psychotherapy, a keynote address on “Whatever Happened to ‘CPE’ – Clinical Pastoral Education?”. followed later in the year by the 1<sup>st</sup> Helen Flanders Dunbar Memorial Lecture on Psychosomatic Medicine and Pastoral Care: “Emotionally, Soulfully, Spiritually ‘Free to Think and Act’.”  
On the 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this author’s invited essay, “ ‘Chapter Life’: ‘Thinking and Feeling Together about the Things that Matter Most’ – ‘A New and Vitalizing Experience’.”
